

The March 10, 2026 township annual meeting is your chance to pass resolutions and to object to corruption in your county.

With the Declaration of Independence in 1776, our country was made a republic and "We the People" were in charge of the government. The grassroots authority for our area also came from the treaty law. We are part of the Louisiana Purchase. Elections are part of our power that the grassroots people have.

The Act of 1781 changed the USA government as it went incorporated but left us citizens out of the corporation and in the republic thereby preserving the "We the People" fourth branch of the government.

Over the last 150 years, the corporate government has slowly convinced people that they care for us and we deserve conveniences. Little by little throughout the decades, "We the People" forfeited our authority for these conveniences. In 1988, Minnesota legislators greatly reduced our grassroots power with statutes discontinuing the constable. (Prince Andrew was arrested by a local deputy constable). State statutes have left the common person without subpoena powers and the authority to conduct a common law grand jury which greatly reduces accountability.

Here today in the county, elections are the only thing we grassroots voters have left to limit corporate government. Now that the county assessor and the clerk are appointed, our county auditor-treasurer is really the only one left to answer to "We the People" but is surrounded by corporate government. Can county commissioners really look their constituents in the eye and really say they represent you when they desire to make the office of the county auditor-treasurer appointed?? Isn't that office the only one left standing between "We the People" and the corporate government? Without that electable office, aren't we open to uncontrollable taxation? When county commissioners appoint officers like the assessor, clerk and auditor; they violate our civil liberties and rights.
